The Price of A Slave



An average slave in the American South in 1850 cost the equivalent of £30,000 in today's money

Global Picture of Modern Slavery

It is estimated that around **45.8 million people** are in some form of modern slavery across **167 countries**

- 25 million victims of forced labour
- **15 million** in forced marriage
- **71%** of modern slavery victims account for women and girls
- 1 in 4 victims are children

Affects nearly every country

Forced labour generates **\$150 billion** in illegal profits per year

Crime Against Humanity

TRAFFICKING = A FORM OF MODERN DAY SLAVERY A human rights violation



What is modern slavery?

	Smuggling	Slavery/Trafficking
Crime	Against the State	Against an Individual
Relationship	One-off Service	Treated as a commodity/owned
Length	Voluntary - short term	Continued Relationship
Profit	One-off transaction	On-going exploitation for profit
Borders	Must involve crossing a border	No requirement

Child Trafficking Definition

• Any child recruited/transported for exploitative reasons is considered to be a victim of trafficking, regardless of whether they have been forced or deceived as they cannot give consent.

Any child who is recruited, transported, transferred or harboured for an exploitative reason is a victim of trafficking.

• Article 3d of the Palermo Protocol defines a child as any person under eighteen years of age.

ACT + PURPOSE = CHILD TRAFFICKING



Modern Slavery Act 2015 – Provision, Powers & Duties

- Consolidates Trafficking and Slavery related offences under one umbrella
- Increases sentences to potential life imprisonment
- Statutory defence for victims to prevent criminalisation
- **Duty to Notify** Home Office of all potential victims Police, LA, NCA and GLAA
- **Duty of enquiry** Local Authority if they suspect modern slavery offences
- New court measures: Prevention Orders & Risk Orders

General Indicators



- Fearful, anxious or distrustful
- Appear malnourished
- Show signs of trauma (physical/psychological)
- Suffer from injuries
- Unfamiliar with local language/context
- Control Allow others to speak for them when addressed directly
- **Dependent** on someone else
- Believe they have to pay **debt** off
- Without appropriate ID documents
- **Do not know** home or work **address**
- Do not have any days off
- Unable to leave their work environment
- Have limited/no social interaction

LOCAL AUTHORITY ROLE


- First responder role
- Local authority responsibility to lead on safeguarding enquiries
- Local authorities have a legal duty to assess adults in need of care and support, and meet 'eligible needs', in a way that promotes their wellbeing. This includes protecting adults from abuse or neglect.
- The Care Act 2014 recognises modern slavery as a form of adult abuse and sets out the responsibilities of local authorities (Section 42)


