Good morning to you all, I hope you and your families are all doing okay.

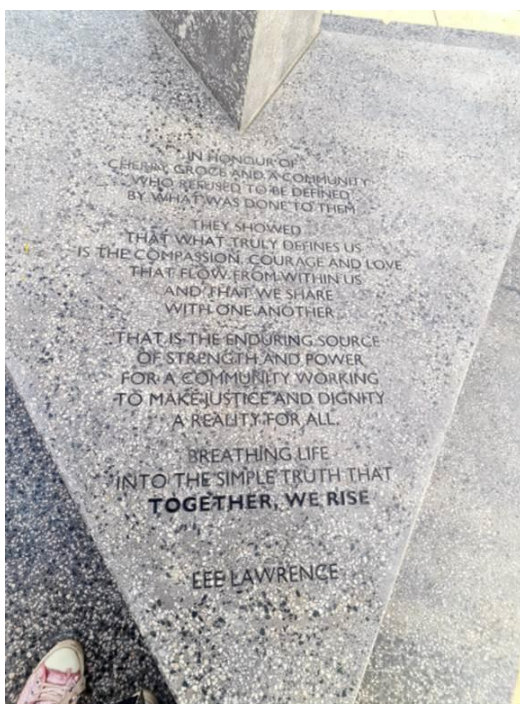
Last week's news of the conviction on all three counts of Derek Chauvin for the murder of George Floyd created a huge wave of emotion, for everyone but particularly for our Black community. John Amaechi described it as *"before the verdict I thought I would feel relief, hope..... but when the verdict came through, I felt surprise that justice had been done"*. Ben Lindsey described it as *"justice but I still feel numb"*. I was thinking that night about our FSCF family, and how you were feeling in that moment.

Whilst due process was followed and the evidence rightly and thankfully prevailed for George Floyd's family, John's words that *"accountability for one is not justice for all"* resonated strongly for me. Nor can we ignore that the verdict came down 24 hours before Stephen Lawrence Day, highlighting the movement that followed Stephen's death which is still fighting for racial justice and equity 28 years later. I think Barack and Michelle Obama's statement below summed it up, and we can replace the word American with British and it would still be true.

True justice requires that we come to terms with the fact that Black Americans are treated differently, every day. It requires us to recognize that millions of our friends, family, and fellow citizens live in fear that their next encounter with law enforcement could be their last. And it requires us to do the sometimes thankless, often difficult, but always necessary work of making the America we know more like the America we believe in.

As ever, if the news cycle last week affected you, please do reach out to a friend, your line manager, whoever you trust to explore that with you, I look forward now still more to our own event on 4 May where we will decide together what our service goals for racial justice will be. Because the work goes on.

And I got extra motivation from the unveiling of this memorial to Cherry Groce in Windrush Square in Brixton this weekend. The shooting of Cherry Groce by police sparked the Brixton uprising in 1985. Feels like these messages are ones to hold onto in our racial justice work (credit to Nadine White, Race Correspondent at the Independent, for the image below shared on social media).

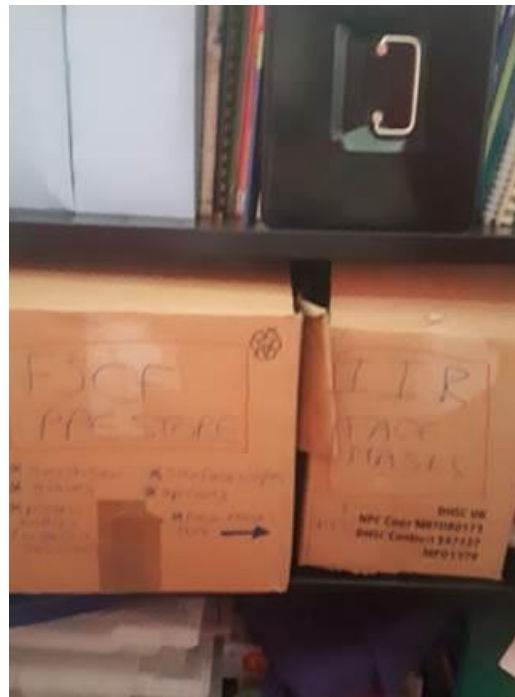
Recording of Our Whole Service Briefing on Updated PPE Guidance
