

## COVID Email Update 24 May 2021

Good morning to you all, I hope you and your families are all doing okay.

A full 12 months has passed since the murder of George Floyd on 25 May 2020. One of my heroes Congressman and lifelong civil rights activist John Lewis, who also passed last year, always seemed to find the right words for any occasion, and it makes sense to me to centre him and his wisdom today.

“Take a long, hard look down the road you will have to travel once you have made a commitment to work for change. Know that this transformation will not happen right away. Change often takes time. It rarely happens all at once. In the movement, we didn't know how history would play itself out. When we were getting arrested and waiting in jail or standing in unmovable lines on the courthouse steps, we didn't know what would happen, but we knew it had to happen.

Use the words of the movement to pace yourself. We used to say that ours is not the struggle of one day, one week, or one year. Ours is not the struggle of one judicial appointment or presidential term. Ours is the struggle of a lifetime, or maybe even many lifetimes, and each one of us in every generation must do our part. And if we believe in the change we seek, then it is easy to commit to doing all we can, because the responsibility is ours alone to build a better society and a more peaceful world.”

For our service, we keep onwards. Our racial justice and equity goals will help to keep purpose to our action over the next 12 months. We are far from where we want to be, but far from where we used to be. This week, I wonder if you might find a few minutes to reflect on things you notice as different to 12 months ago. Where is racial justice, identity, equity, cultural humility showing up? Is this in a new or different way or in the same way? What events/talks/webinars/tools/conversations on racial justice and equity have stood out for you in the last year and why? And what next?

One difference for me is that the image below is now pinned to the wall above my desk at home. It wasn't 12 months ago. It should have been. But it now serves as a daily reminder to me to be more intentional in, and conscious of, the decisions I make and the actions I take. We keep onwards.



Updates for you this week:

### Use of 5PS After 21 June

We now have some messages from Corporate about plans for 5PS after 21 June. It looks like some additional staff will be able to be in the building with continued social distancing. However, the number of people in 5PS will continue to be restricted until September, and home working will continue until at least then.

As Family Early Help are a priority 1 group (e.g. we have needed to use the building throughout COVID), we may also be able to access additional seats so that we can accommodate all our Family Early Help staff each week rather than every fortnight from 21 June. This would enable us to lift the bubble rotas and the 1 week Camden:1 week remote approach.

We are also considering viability of returning to the 3 community sites at Netherwood, Chamberlain and the Winch post 21 June. This assumes that the Governments final stage of lifting lockdown goes ahead on that date, which is far from certain at this point.

I've asked your service managers to have discussions with you in team meetings to understand how lifting the bubble rota might feel for you and what's important to you about using Council and other buildings after 21 June. Please be assured the only thing that matters to me is continuing to do all we can to keep you safe and well. We will plan this next bit of the future together, and as ever being led by the expert advice of Public Health. I will schedule a whole service briefing for the second week in June for us to walk it through.

### Vaccination Now Available for Anyone Aged 32 or Over

You can now book a COVID vaccination appointment online without needing an invitation letter if you are aged 32 or over (or will turn 32 before 1 July), or are extremely clinically vulnerable, clinically vulnerable, have a learning disability, are a registered unpaid carer, or are a health and social care worker. ### Additional ways to get your vaccine as an eligible priority worker

For those of you who are frontline staff and eligible for priority vaccination, you can now either book through the NHS vaccination online system or you can use drop-in sessions in and around Camden. This may suit people with changing schedules that cannot commit to a specific appointment time.
