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We have identified 5 key areas which will help us work towards greater co-production with Camden residents. These were shaped by people who draw on care and support and carers, internal and external colleagues, and community organisations.

Across each priority, we have included the short-, medium- and long-term actions we will take as an organisation and in partnership to achieve better outcomes for people over the next five years. We will review these actions each year and monitor our progress through new and existing outcomes frameworks which will be developed during the implementation phase.

This strategy is intended to be used alongside an action plan, the delivery of which will be overseen by the Supporting People, Connecting Communities Board. We will also establish a Residents Advisory Board which will see greater oversight from people who draw on services.





1. Understanding and Confidence

In Adult Social Care, we've seen successful partnerships, but we want to make sure everyone understands what co-production really means (and what it doesn't) so we can work together consistently across our services. It's not about learning lots of new concepts, but about recognising how our co-production principles match the way we're working already and using this as our foundation to build upon. Developing a shared understanding and providing both our workforce and residents with the skills and tools needed to co-produce is essential to embedding co-production as our standard practice.

2. Cultural Growth

By organisational 'culture' we mean our shared values, beliefs, attitudes, and behaviours which guide how we interact and work together. For co-production to work well, we need a shift in our culture towards open, transparent decision-making, with Adult Social Care facilitating rather than making decisions. To achieve this, we must recognise the importance of people's lived experiences in shaping services and give our workforce the time, space, and financial resources to co-produce. Time investment is crucial to building trusting relationships, actively seeking out and working with seldom heard communities and enabling us to work with people at their own pace.

How we will move forward together

- Work in line with our guiding principles of co-production
- Recognise individual responsibilities in working towards equal partnerships with residents
- Highlight co-production within Quality Assurance guidance, including our Adult Social Care Supervision Policy and Auditing Framework
- Explore barriers to co-production within each of our departments and develop solutions
- Implement a consistent approach to Reward and Recognition for involvement in co-production through new guidance
- Map the projected costs of coproduction to inform resource allocation

In the medium term we will

- Continue to allocate resources to coproduction
- Include co-production as a requirement within all commissioning contracts and job descriptions where appropriate
- Recognise and be honest about any resistance to change and explore ways we can address this
- Collaborate more with local organisations to leverage additional support and resources

3. Equity and Inequalities

Tackling inequalities and reducing disparities in health and social care outcomes is one of our key priorities. We need to do more to ensure residents have equality of access and experience across Adult Social Care and co-production is central to making sure our services work for the many and not the few.

A common challenge is that we often see the same people taking part in co-production. It's important that we work with diverse groups that reflect our communities, so we don't miss nuances in experience that are vital to improving our services. By prioritising working with seldom heard communities, we can better address systemic inequalities, promote social justice, and create a more inclusive social care system.

4. Greater Power Sharing

Genuine co-production involves sharing decision making power with people who draw on services. Across Adult Social Care, we frequently engage and consult with residents around their experiences to improve our services, but fewer projects use a co-design or co-production approach. Conversations and mapping to develop this framework also showed good 'individual level' co-production, but less opportunities for people to be involved in developing services and in wider strategic planning.

If we are to reach our ambition to co-produce our plans whenever possible we need to get better at understanding what genuine power sharing looks like and expand opportunities for people to be involved as equal partners in decision making.

How we will move forward together

- Work in a way that builds on people's strengths and empowers residents to have greater choice and control over their care and support
- Explore power sharing within teams and what this means in our roles
- Offer a variety of ways for people to be involved in designing and delivering services
- Work with commissioners to put people at the heart of procurement
- Commit to involving residents from the start of projects when using a co-design or co-production approach
- Be honest about the level of influence people can have
- Develop support options for people involved in co-production

In the medium term we will

- Continue to invest in training and support for co-producers and facilitators
- Offer opportunities to shadow Strategic Supporting Communities Connecting Communities board meetings as part of our learning offer
- Develop our pathways for co-production in service provision
- Monitor the impact of changes to how we work



In partnership

- Continue to develop our plans together
- Explore test and learn opportunities within our emerging Neighbourhoods work
- Set up a quarterly meeting to explore co-production within the Supporting People, Connecting Communities programme
- Connect with local partners to develop our understanding of power sharing and how people with lived experience can be more involved within services and across long-term planning
- Set up a Residents
 Advisory Board to provide input, guidance and recommendations around new and existing coproduction projects
- Build on our work from test and learn projects
- Establish and support peer-to-peer networks
- Involve residents in decisions about budget allocation
- Explore pathways to employment through involvement in coproduction

How we will know we're successful in the longer term

- Everyone has a good understanding of what power sharing means in Adult Social Care
- There is commitment to genuine co-production across all staffing levels including front line services, commissioning and senior leadership
- We have opportunities for people to be involved as equal partners in decision making at all levels of co-production including individual, service /operational and strategic
- People who draw on services have better outcomes through involvement

5. Monitoring and Evaluating Co-production

Regular monitoring and evaluation enable us to continually learn and improve how we work. Setting up new monitoring and evaluation mechanisms for co-production will help us identify gaps in who we are working with and measure the impact of collaboration in terms of outcomes for people and services. It will also mean we can share the knowledge and insights we've gained from co-production, leading to a better understanding of what's working well and where we need to adjust our approach going forward.
